






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CENTRAL LIBRARY USER FEEDBACK PERFORMA




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EVALUATION OF ORGANIZATION CLIMATE -FEEDBACK REPORT

CRITERION I - CURRICULAR ASPECTS

1.1 - Curriculum Planning and Implementation

1.1.1 – Institution has the mechanism for well planned curriculum delivery and documentation. Explain in 500 words

The institution follows the curriculum set by the Rehabilitation Council of India duly approved by Bangalore as well as Bengaluru North University for both UG and PG courses. As per the university calendar of 14+2 weeks, subjects are distributed across 6 semesters for UG and 4 semesters for PG. The course places equal emphasis on theoretical and clinical exposure . Depending on the semester of study, an 8-hour day calendar is divided into 4 hours of theory classes and 4 hours of practical/clinical work, either assessment or rehabilitation. Experienced senior faculty introduce the core subjects for the first semester UG in addition to observation of clinical assessments and therapy procedures as practicals under the supervision of clinical faculty. From the second year of UG, students undertake clinical/practical work under supervision and are able to independently handle clients by the time they enter the mandatory internship of one year at the end of third year of studies. The PG students carry out an independent Dissertation as a part of the curriculum in the second year. Clinical conference is a weekly event held to give exposure to unusual clinical conditions and ways to deal with them. A weekly Journal club focusing on the most recent research in a specific area of Speech/language /hearing also is organized to instil a thirst for knowledge. Teachers prepare lesson plans which involve direct teaching, self e learning as well as assignments. The Principal evaluates the progress of delivery of the curriculum during the faculty meetings held every month and periodic feedback of the students. The exam

coordinator prepares the timetable for internal assessment tests which are held twice in a semester. The class teacher monitors the overall performance as well as the attendance of the student to bring about timely intervention. Students who fail to reach the necessary benchmarks are given additional chances to improve their performance. Parents receive regular feedback of their wards. Teachers use the ICT method in the classroom; all classes are equipped with smart TVS that are internet enabled. The curriculum is supplemented by seminars and demonstrations by experts from other Universities within India and abroad. The institute has floated the DR.SRCISH travel fellowship for an academician in the field to travel to India for the annual conference of the Indian Speech and Hearing Association in his/her area of interest and spend two days in the institute interacting with students and disseminating information from his area of interest. Professor John Grose, an Auditory psychophysicist was the travel fellow in February 2019. In addition, a minimum of two national level seminar/workshops are organized where industry and academic experts interact with participants providing food for thought and a global perspective . Once the results are announced by the university, the Exam coordinator analyses the results to get an overall perspective and also to find out any specific subject related issues. Accordingly, modifications if needed are suggested in teaching method, adding more audio-visual resources etc. Further ,the library committee meets once a year to carry out stock verification and to list out replacements as needed .At the beginning of UG and PG programs, list of required books as per the curriculum for the year is prepared to replenish the reading resources .Online resources are printed for easy access.

1.4.2 – How the feedback obtained is being analyzed and utilized for overall development of the institution? (maximum 500 words)

Feedback Obtained

Feedback from students and parents is obtained using prescribed formats. However, alumni and employer feedback is generally informal. The comments given by students are used as a base to constructively modify the curriculum delivery. For example, the students preferred to work with disorders that they have had theoretical exposure to. When the therapy schedule was being prepared, this request was considered and adhered to. The curriculum requires students to work with typically developing individuals to get an understanding of procedure, obtaining normative values etc for which separate time is not earmarked. The class schedule now includes an hour of demonstration from the subject teacher, and specific clinical practicum hours designated for collecting normatives. As per the feedback, an hour in a week has been given for extracurricular activities. Expert series lectures are organized on general and current topics to give them a world view. Based on the parent feedback, notice about the student's attendance is now being sent atleast twice in a semester. After the results of semester end exams are announced by the University, a parentteacher meeting is held to make them aware of the consequences for continuation of the course, beginning of internship etc. Alumni feedback is utilized to hone on the topics for conferences. Once the students enter the workforce, they are able to pinpoint the lacunae if any in training . For example, soft skill development, report writing, interaction with other professionals etc which get addressed by experts during seminars/workshops organized annually. The informal feedback obtained from the employers also has highlighted the need to develop punctuality, commitment and responsible behaviour which are addressed during placement sessions at the end of the course. The institute is now preparing formats for formal feedbacks from teachers, employers and alumni.

In the clinics there are batches of 8 that are taught by a clinical supervisor who not only monitors them, but helps out with issues that occur in clinics. Atmosphere is friendly and students are free to meet HOD and Principal. This is a small college and every student is known to staff who keep an eye and report any student who looks unhappy or not performing well. In the NAAC format, no space is given to clinical supervisors (15 in number) who also teach clinically. So the actual ratio of staff to students is 1:5.9.

They take up independent projects as extra mural, help college faculty with intra mural projects and coordinate dissertations through college faculty. Rs 50 lakhs has been allocated as corpus fund for the maintenance of the centre.To facilitate and encourage faculty undertaking research the institute provides funds of upto 2 lakhs per department. BNGRC also coordinates with college on ethical committee meetings and research technical committee meetings. Research ethics committee was

	held in Jan 2019 for the approval of student proposed research topics. Two faculty members received support from BNGRC while manuscript preparation and submission of articles for publication. Research Projects have been prepared and submitted to DST, ICMR, ICSSR and CSR of ONGC, MRPL. Total of 13 projects have been submitted. Intra mural projects have been undertaken in each departments. Total of 6 projects are underway. Another important development was data mining and data analysis which started in 2018. This gives information on demography, agewise afflictions and, strategies used for assessment and remediation procedures.

CRITERION I – CURRICULAR ASPECTS

1.1 - Curriculum Planning and Implementation

1.1.1 – Institution has the mechanism for well planned curriculum delivery and documentation. Explain in 500 words

The curriculum committee headed by Principal prepares the list of subject teachers at least a month before the semester is due to begin for both UG and PG classes. The subjects are distributed across 6 semesters for UG and 4 semesters for PG as per the university calendar. An 8-hour day calendar is divided into 4 hours of theory classes and 4 hours of practical/clinical work, either assessment or rehabilitation. The teachers then prepare hour-wise lesson plans for the entire paper with clear descriptions of content to be covered and the mode of delivery of content. For each unit, method of evaluation of content understanding as well as application ability is specified. The lesson plans are prepared by following the curriculum set by the Rehabilitation Council of India duly approved by Bangalore as well as Bengaluru North University for both UG and PG courses. Teachers make sure to include certain amount of self-learning along with direct teaching and demonstrations. Teachers use innovative teaching methods to make the course content more interesting and engaging. Experienced faculty introduce the core subjects for the first semester UG in addition to clinical teaching. From the second year of UG, students undertake clinical/practical work under supervision and are able to independently handle clients by the time they enter the mandatory internship of one year at the end of third year of studies. The PG students carry out an independent Dissertation as a part of the curriculum in the second year. Clinical conference is held to give exposure to ways to deal with rare clinical conditions. A Journal club

focusing on the most recent research in a specific area of Speech/language /hearing also is also organized. Due to the pandemic, face to face classes were discontinued from mid-march 2020. However, syllabus was covered through online mode, either through zoom platform or through google classroom. Exam coordinator prepares the time table for internal assessments to be conducted during the semesters. The Principal conducts review meetings monthly to monitor the timely delivery of course content and suggests modifications in methodology of teaching if lacunae are found. Seminar/workshops are organized with academic experts in the field to provide update on the recent research and its applications in the field. This year, Dr. Caroline Bowen CPSP, ASHA Fellow, Hon. FRCSLT, the 6th Dr. S.R. Chandrasekhar Travel Fellowship Awardee visited the institute on 12th February 2020. She delivered a talk on "Making the Minute's Count: Streamlining Assessment and Intervention for Children with Speech Sound Disorders". She interacted with faculty and students by delivering lectures from her area of interest for two days. In addition, the library committee meets twice a year to carry out stock verification and to list out replacements as needed. At the beginning of UG and PG programs, list of required books as per the curriculum for the year is prepared to replenish the reading resources. Online resources are printed for easy access.

In addition, with the formation of buzz groups, and opinion polls, there is greater interaction and students are assessed for which additional marks are given. Feedback is provided. Assignments are submitted online. This enables students to meet deadlines. Tests are also conducted online. Students are now interacting on WhatsApp groups and with the teacher. The CIE thus makes more use of difficulties exhibited by students to modify or review teaching. The reforms initiated on CIE have enabled better performance in examinations.

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5.3.2 – Activity of Student Council & representation of students on academic & administrative bodies/committees of the institution (maximum 500 words)

The student council, called Student Association of Speech and Hearing or SASH conducts events throughout the academic year for students. The various festivals are also celebrated year-round along with competitions and talent shows. The student council also has an hour every week for new announcements, brainstorming sessions and to conduct games for the students to bring some fun into the everyday academic life. The student union also is open to hear any complaints or requests and acts as a bridge between the staff and students and helps the student voices to be heard. Inter-collegiate meets were encouraged and students participated in the Bangalore North University Sports and Cultural meets in November 2019 and even won 2nd place overall in the cultural meets. The college believes in participative approach at all levels to ensure that the vision and mission of the Bangalore Speech and Hearing Trust, are realized through its goals and objectives with clear-delegation of powers as described below. 1.Academic Autonomy - The course is regulated by RCI and Bangalore North University by which the degrees are conferred. The delivery of course content and conducting of assessment of students and semester end valuation are under the purview of academic bodies of the college and the Boards of Studies (BOS). Faculty of the Institute are holding positions of chairperson of BOS and some serve as internal members. Similarly, Institute members have served on expert committee of RCI. Academic council, Research council and other such academic bodies are vested with the powers to design, implement, monitor, evaluate and report on the various academic and research activities of the college and institute. They are completely composed of teaching staff and external experts and are effectively functioning and carrying out their responsibilities. 2. Administrative powers - the Board of Trustees of Bangalore Speech and Hearing Trust through its Management Committee Members (MCM) have defined the roles, responsibilities of the principal, heads of department, senior faculty, and administrative staff. Standard operating procedures with regard to policy governance, implementation of new rules and regulations of academics are with the principal. The governing council with its internal members and external experts monitors the activity of the institute and college and have annual meeting. Meeting for year 2019-20 was held on 13th November 2019. The MCM have the responsibility of recruitment and retaining of staff, service conditions, terminal benefits, leave management, promotions, statutory compliances, decision making, grievance redressal etc and the composition of the scientific and academic bodies with the help of advisors and principal. Case example 1. The College academic committee realized the need for an additional course, PG Diploma in AVT, and hence formulated course curriculum. It's a new course, and with active persuasion and representation at various levels, it's now recognized by both RCI and Bangalore North University. The Dr SRC College is now, since 2019, one of the two institutes offering this course in India. It will help many children with hearing impaired avail the services of trained professionals for auditory verbal therapy and language acquisition and integration into the society. Case example 2 The senior faculty who has one area of clinical specialty are entrusted with that specialty clinic. Dr. B S Premalatha expert in swallowing disorders is entrusted with day to day functioning of Dysphagia clinic and training of students in that area. HODs are entrusted with supervision of practical work / training of UG and PG students and monitoring and documenting their quality of learning. Committees have been formed. Each department conducts its internal meeting and reports to the management. Regular faculty meetings are conducted which allows all teaching staff to discuss in open forum. To provide autonomy to think independently, the clinical work is carried out as units headed by the senior faculty under whom junior staff are trained. Clinical seminars are held to groom students, junior faculty and participating senior faculty. Similarly, senior faculty prepares post graduate students and staff on selection of topics from recent journal articles to be presented and discussed in the journal club. Each staff who

Library, ICT and Physical Infrastructure / Instrumentation

Library, ICT and Physical Infrastructure / Instrumentation- New text books/reference books and journals were added to the library. Access to National Knowledge Network, INFLIBNET and relevant online databases is made available. Library committee has been constituted for smooth functioning of library activities. Committee has organized following events: 1. Library Orientation program for newly admitted students 2. Orientation to staff and students on logging in to INFLIBNET and Thieme Publications. 3. Orientation to staff on use of INFLIBNET and demonstration of Journal search options on that. Library committee conducted two meetings to discuss the books and journals to be purchased for the year 2019-2020. This list was forwarded to Management committee for approval. Feedback from students regarding library facility is taken every year. All classrooms are ICT enabled since Jan 2019. Classrooms were provided with LCD and Wi-Fi facilities. Software are loaded in computers for students to practice activities related to voice analysis, voice recording, speech analysis. Computerized equipments are available for clinical work and practicum. The equipment purchased in previous year are subjected to annual calibration. New equipment related to balance and vertigo assessment was purchased (vHIT). Software's are indigenously developed for tracking the academic progress and attendance of students and examination related information. Wi-Fi facility is strengthened to accommodate additional online activity due to COVID-19 situation: - online classes and tele practice etc. Feedback and troubleshooting mechanism are in place now, for issues related to breakdown in network and internet connection. University portal is being used for e governance, student feedback, virtual notices, examination related information to students. Laptops are added to the existing ones to accommodate increase in need in online therapy and classes with the help of

Research and Development

Research and Development- College teams up with the standalone Research Center of Bangalore Speech and Hearing Trust- Dr SRC- BNG Research Center. Research Advisory committee supervises the research work of the college as well. The research technical and ethical committee of research centre helps the college with scrutiny of research proposals of students/staff for dissertation and publication. Two faculty members received support from BNGRC for manuscript preparation and submission of articles for publication. Faculty of the college also submits Research Projects proposals to DST, ICMR, ICSSR and CSR of ONGC, through the BNGRC. Total of 6 projects are underway as intramural projects. Another important development was data mining and data analysis which started in 2018. This gives information on demography, age-wise afflictions and, strategies used for assessment and remediation procedures. BNGRC has MOU with JSS Institute of Speech and Hearing- Mysore, Siddaganga Institute of Technology - Tumkur, Rajiv Gandhi Institute of technology-Bangalore, NITTE- Meenakshi Institute of Speech and Hearing - Mangalore/Bangalore for collaboration in Research. Our Institute has joined the Multi-centric study initiated by UN and Macquarie University. The proposal was scrutinized by the research committee and ethical committee in april-2020/ sep 2020. Students from medical faculty are encouraged to participate in research activities and to present papers in Annual Research Society Conference. Research methodology workshops and manuscript writing workshops are conducted Two faculty members presented scientific papers at the American Speech and Hearing Association Convention held at Florida, USA, in Nov 2019. One faculty presented virtually at the American Audiology Association, USA which was a virtual conference due to the pandemic in April 2020). Three students are pursuing their PhD under Bangalore university (2014-till date). One of them is an inservice candidate. The institute gave Rs 5000/- each as incentives to three faculty members for their scientific

publications, and provided travel grant
to three faculty members to present
scientific papers in various
conferences/ Seminar. Three scientific
papers were published by the faculty in
various journals in the period
2019-2020. Two faculty are also
reviewers of PhD work/ part of DAC of

Institutes. A benchmark of a minimum of

thesis. Routinely Intramural projects
receive funds from the Institute.

Examination and Evaluation

Examinations and evaluations are conducted as per the rule and regulations of the University of Bangalore and Bengaluru North University. The senior faculty attended the Board of Studies (BOS) and Board of Examiners (BOE) meetings of the Bangalore University and Bengaluru North University. Faculty were deputed for paper valuation of the UG and PG examinations conducted by the university. Principal directed the faculty to be invigilators for the university examinations. Additionally, continuous assessments of students are conducted through test papers and assignments by the respective teacher. For UG and PG students, formative assessment are conducted twice in a semester for theory papers and once for clinical training, at the end of clinical posting. Online MCQs are made available in Google classroom regularly to the students to enhance the selflearning process. University examinations results are analysed to monitor the performance of students. Transparency is maintained in examination system. Students access exam related information and their results through dedicated online app of the university or at the website of the university. Orientation to this are offered at the beginning of the semester. It's the only Institute in Bangalore university offering PhD program in speech and Hearing. Three students are at the submission phase of their thesis.

Teaching and Learning

Teaching and Learning- • Online mode of lectures and practical orientation was adopted by the faculty during the

covid-19 scenario. All UG and PG classes are being delivered on Google classroom. Administration and system engineer have obtained institutional subscription for Google classroom (education) and have facilitated with necessary internet and computer infrastructure. Bandwidth is adequate to carry out multiple session of videoaudio programs simultaneously. • 3 rd Batch of Fellowship programme (3 months duration) was conducted on speech and swallowing rehabilitation in Head and Neck Cancer and 2nd Batch of fellowship on cochlear implant and rehabilitation for working professionals with focus on intensive hands on training. •

Conducted conferences/short

lectures/seminars to help the faculty and students update on the current trends in the field. Deputed staff to attend seminars and conferences to have hands-on experience of various techniques and strategies to improve patient health care. • Staffs were involved in conducting/ participating as resource persons in online webinars in the covid -19 lockdown period and thereafter. • A workshop on "Teaching Learning for Teachers of Audiology and Speech Pathology " about curriculum delivery was organized in conjunction with team of faculty from Department of Speech Pathology and Audiology- KMC, Mangalore. (12/09/2019 - to 14/12/2019)

• An online orientation program on Incorporating mixed mode of learning and how to structure syllabus to incorporate self learning options for students apart from class room learning was arranged in Feb 2020. Dr Krishna Y from MAHE, Manipal conducted this program. • Conducted Kannada classes to first year students to help them cope with case load. Special practical classes were arranged for those with difficulty in learning. • Exposure to specialized units such as Auditory Verbal Therapy Unit, Vertigo and Balance clinic, Neuro-rehabilitation Communication Disorders unit and Dysphagia Unit to supplement student's theoretical knowledge through clinical experience. • Intensive Clinical Teaching which includes live

Teaching which includes live demonstration and videos illustrating assessment and management of various speech and hearing disorders is adopted

by the School of Audiology and Speech Language Pathology. Dedicated hours mentioned in syllabus for practical training are being used effectively during COVID-19 by adopting online mode as well. • Field visits are arranged for BASLP students Curriculum Development- • The College Curriculum Development academic committee under the leadership of Dr. Madhuri Gore, expert in cochlear implant rehabilitation was involved in drafting the syllabi and course structure for new course P G Diploma in AVT. This was done along with RCI and later was approved by BNU academic council. The course saw first batch in 2019 and the college is one of the only two institutes recognized for this program. • Curriculum development of other courses are as per the syllabus approved by the Rehabilitation Council of India. • Senior faculty are the members of Board of studies of University of Bangalore (2017-2020) and Bengaluru North University (2018-2021). • Curriculum delivery is documented through teaching plan at the beginning of every semester, which is reviewed by the Principal and Vice Principal. the curriculum delivery methods and hours and assessment methods are planned in this. • Compliance to Higher Education Ministry, BNU, circulars to implement online mode for students during COVID-19 lockdown period. Faculty quickly adapted to online mode using Learning strategies like MOOC, and YouTube. 1.1 - Curricular Planning and Implementation

1.1.1 - The Institution ensures effective curriculum delivery through a well planned and documented process

The Principal conducts meetings with the Heads of departments to discuss the delivery of curriculum for the respective semesters for UG and PG classes at least two weeks before the semesters begins. Subjects are distributed based on the interest/specialization of the faculty. Senior faculty with more than three years of teaching experience are given the papers for PG classes and faculty with less than three years of experience teach UG classes. Each faculty handles a minimum of two subjects in a semester. A time table is prepared by a faculty keeping in mind the balancing of clinical and theory hours. The faculty are expected to prepare lesson plans and submit it to the college office within 15 days of the assignment of the subject. Monthly meetings are held by the Principal to ensure that curriculum delivery is timely and portions are covered as foreseen in the lesson plan. The involvement of faculty in practicum teaching also is monitored. Possible field trips/industry visits that can enhance the curriculum are listed out and class teachers are entrusted with the responsibility of arranging for the same. Each class is also assigned a class-teacher who acts as a conduit between the students and the Principal.

2.2 - Catering to Student Diversity

2.2.1 - The institution assesses the learning levels of the students and organizes special Programmes for advanced learners and slow learners

Assessment: The policy of the college is to encourage learning and development of skills in all learners. Assessment of learning happens through Quizzes, regular assignments and short assignments to be completed during class hours. These give the teacher an idea

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of quality of learning, and confidence of student and identify poor learners.

Students are encouraged to do self learning by finding resources online and present in class.

Advanced learners get challenging topics to present in class. They are encouraged to share their learning in brainstorming sessions, that lead to a lot of learning even in slow learners. In UG classes, students are encouraged to sum up learning at the end of the hour.

Clinical teaching was based on case studies, discussions on causes and how the person could be counselled. Role play for therapy was utilized.

For advanced learners: Advanced learners are encouraged to work on research papers along with staff, collect data and participate in writing papers. They are encouraged to participate in advanced clinical assessment.

For slow learners: One on one teaching, specific difficulty explained find resources to learn. Good students are paired with slow learners in specific subjects. Postings to special clinics is planned.

2.3 - Teaching- Learning Process

2.3.1 - Student centric methods, such as experiential learning, participative learning and problem solving methodologies are used for enhancing learning experiences

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Techniques: Student centric methods were used in all classroom teaching. Interactive sessions were the norm. Techniques such as Brainstorming, or creation of buzz group(more in offline teaching-each bench of students working on a particular topic), are utilized depending on the topic. Typically, teachers evaluated learning through interaction, an oral Quiz after each session and scheduled tests.

Experiential learning: UG students used of freely downloadable Apps such as Hz which generates pure tones in wide range- these help in understanding of hearing range. The HearWHO and Indian hearing test are other Apps measure hearing. Noise measuring Apps, Apps for therapy help in understanding the use of the material. Blended learning was much used during online classes and has continued offline.

Masters students used programs like Pratt, Audacity to understand spectrograms or synthesise stimuli. - Submissions on whatsAPP during class encouraged peer assisted learning.

Clinical teaching- Special teaching for online speech language therapy was conducted. To avoid learning gaps in clinical audiology, case presentations, assessments, findings were presented by students under the direction of staff. Think Pair Share technique was utilized- students created clinical quizzes and others answered. Online clinical supervision on a one to one basis was appreciated by students.

Modifications of teaching process has occurred during the pandemic. Online classes required greater creativity and more interaction. Students in general were more responsive when lectures were online, less afraid to ask questions. On the other hand, internet resources were used as never before. Difficult topics were illustrated through figures and video recordings. For e.g the McGurk Effect was illustrated through a video and used to teach categorical perception as well. Nystagmus, voice disorders and swallowing disorders were

illustrated through videos and links shared. Students were encouraged to find good learning material.

Special programs conducted for swallowing for MASLP students who wanted more exposure.

The institute has a total of 27,880 sq.ft campus area. The institute building has ground floor, 1st floor, 2nd floor and 3rd floor. The first three floors are dedicated to patient care and the 3rd floor is alloted for academic purposes.

The classrooms are provided with digital monitors supported by HDMI ports for teaching (theory and practicals), video illustrations. 2. Department of Speech & Language Studies: It consists of two main sub divisions: Speech Diagnostics and Speech Therapy which inturn has several special units to provide high quality care for patients with speech and language disorder.

Standard operating procedures with regard to policy governance, implementation of new rules and regulations of academics are with the principal.

The governing council with its internal members and external experts monitors the activity of the institute and college and have annual meeting. Meeting for year 2020-21 wereheld on 10th September 2020, 20th November 2020, 12th January 2021, 30th January 2021, 04th February 2021,22nd February 2021,19th July 2021, 27th October 2021, 21st December 2021.

The MCM have the responsibility of recruitment and retaining of staff, service conditions, terminal benefits, leave management, promotions, statutory compliances, decision making, grievance redressal etc and the composition of the scientific and academic bodies with the help of advisors and principal.

Case example 1.

The College Staff meetings took stock of situation during covid lockdown situation. The requirements of staff in terms of salary for lockdown period was discussed and communicated to management. Upon discussion with management, they decided to pay salary as earlier during lock down period. Work from home was allowed with submission of supportive documents. This was acknowledged and followed by all. Staffs did work online to complete the academic commitment and course contents so that students are not affected by the lockdown.

Case example 2

Faculty meetings took up issues like Covid protocol for clinics and classrooms in line to state guidelines and communicated the same to management. Facilities were installed by management on the basis of recommendations.

Faculty meeting held on 14th May 2021 also looked into teaching learning methods through online. Modifications of clinical curriculum for online methods. These recommendations were implemented in course delivery of even semesters of UG and PG courses.

- The College academic committee under the leadership of Dr. Rashmi J. Bhat, reviewed the course content delivery methods for each course and suggesting provisions to incorporate practical component during regular class hours.
 - During lockdown period due to covid situation, modifications of clinical training was planned and executed. Case discussions and clinical reviews were adopted for lack of direct patient examination. Students active participation in online discussion were enforced and constructive feedback were given to their comments and inputs.
- Three faculty enrolled into PhD Program in a collaborate program offered by research centre of Bangalore Speech and Hearing Trust and Manipal Academy of Higher Education, MAHE.
- Curriculum development of courses are as per the syllabus

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- approved by the Rehabilitation Council of India.
- Senior faculty are the members of Board of studies of Bengaluru North University (2018-2021) Parent University.
- They are also invited to be on members on Board of Studies of external university
- Curriculum delivery is documented through teaching plan at the beginning of every semester, which is reviewed by the Principal and Vice Principal. the curriculum delivery methods and hours and assessment methods are planned in this.
- Compliance to Higher Education Ministry, BNU, circulars to implement online mode for students during covid 19 lockdown period. Online resource materials were used for classroom teaching and adapted some of material for classroom teaching.
- The academic calendar is planned in advance before the term starts and is displayed on the notice boards for the students and circulated periodically through digital platform to students and parents, and is followed meticulously.
- Lecture capture systems are installed in some of the constituent units for the benefit of the students during the post covid 19 classes.
- ICT is an integral part of teaching and learning, as in previous year.
- Also like previous year, NPTEL video lectures, virtual laboratories etc. Are being integrated as a part of regular course work.

Teaching and Learning-

- Online mode of lectures and practical orientation was adopted by the faculty during the covid-19 scenario. During lockdown UG and PG classes were delivered on Google classroom and other times in regular classroom following covid protocol. Infrastructure in terms of Internet facility, wifi and google classroom (education) subscription is provided by Institute for this year also
- Faculty meetings are regularly conducted, inputs of which are communicated to Management for decisions regarding requirements of the department, change in policy, requirements of staffs etc.
- 2. Monthly meetings conducted with Management committee -where HODs of all departments participate and discuss issues pertaining to their departments.

- Conducted conferences/short lectures/seminars to help the faculty and students update on the current trends in the field. Deputed staff to attend seminars and conferences to have hands-on experience of various techniques and strategies to improve patient health care.
- Staffs were involved in conducting/ participating as resource persons in online webinars in the covid -19 lockdown period and thereafter.
- An online webinar on ethics in research by, Dr Usha Manjunath, Director, IIHMR, Bangalore on 18th Aug 2020 in collaboration with Dr SRC BNG Research Center.
- An online workshop on Research methods-A way forward was organized for faculty and PG students on 06th March 2021 was organized in collaboration with Dr SRC BNG Research center.
- Organized Kannada classes to first year students to help them cope with case load. Special practical classes were arranged for those with difficulty in learning.
- Exposure to specialized units such as Auditory Verbal Therapy Unit, Cochlear Implantation Unit, Vertigo and Balance clinic, Neuro-rehabilitation Communication Disorders unit and Dysphagia Unit to supplement student's theoretical knowledge through clinical experience. These could happen partially only due to covid restriction which resulted in reduced patient numbers during regular working periods. Also, lockdown period as per govt regulations reduced clinical exposure to the students.
- Online softwares for voice analysis were effectively used during lockdown period instead of desktop versions. They were incorporated into regular online teaching of relevant course subjects.
- Intensive Clinical Teaching which includes live demonstration and videos illustrating assessment and management of various speech and hearing disorders is adopted by the departments of Audiology and Speech Language Pathology. Dedicated hours mentioned in syllabus for practical training are being used effectively during covid 19 by adopting online mode as well.
- Question Bank was created on subjects of the course and used in regular classroom and online seminars as quiz for students.

Examination and Evaluation-

Examinations and evaluations are conducted as per the rule and regulations of the University of Bangalore and Bengaluru North University. Due to covid even semester exams were not held by the university, instead internal assessments were carried out. However final semester exams were conducted by University. All the final

semester PG students submitted the dissertations, which is a requirement of the course. For odd semester exams were conducted by university and as before.

The senior faculty attended the Board of Studies (BOS) and Board of Examiners (BOE) meetings of the Bangalore University and Bengaluru North University. Faculty were deputed for paper valuation of the UG and PG examinations conducted by the university. Principal directed the faculty to be invigilators for the university examinations. Additionally, continuous assessments of students are conducted through test papers and assignments by the respective teacher. For UG and PG students, formative assessment are conducted twice in a semester for theory papers and once for clinical training, at the end of clinical posting. Online MCQs are made available in Google classroom regularly to the students to enhance the self-learning process. University examinations results are analysed to monitor the performance of students. Transparency is maintained in examination system. Students access exam related information and their results through dedicated online app of the university or at the website of the university. Orientation to this are offered at the beginning of the semester.

It's the only Institute in Bangalore university offering PhD program in speech and Hearing. Three students submitted their thesis in the time period February 2021 to May 2021.

Research and Development-

College teams up with the standalone Research Center of Bangalore Speech and Hearing Trust- Dr SRC- BNG Research Center. Research Advisory committee supervises the research work of the college as well. The research technical and ethical committee of research center helps the college with scrutiny of research proposals of students/staff for dissertation and publication.

Four Faculty Members registered for PhD through the research centre in September 2020 and three of them are continuing their PhD currently.

BNGRC has MOU with JSS Institute of Speech and Hearing- Mysore, Siddaganga Institute of Technology- Tumkur, Rajiv Gandhi Institute of technology-Bangalore, NITTE- Meenakshi Institute of Speech and Hearing - Mangalore/Bangalore for collaboration in Research.

Our Institute have joined the Multi-centric study initiated by UN and Macquarie University. The project is now complete, work is submitted to the main investigator and its payment is received by the institution.

Students from medical faculty are encouraged to participate in research activities and to present papers in Annual Conferences in India and Abroad.

Research methodology workshops and manuscript writing workshops are conducted regularly to help faculty and PG students.

Three faculty are also reviewers of PhD work/ part of DAC of PhD in different Universities and Institutes.

One faculty (Dr Madhuri Gore) is co guide for a PhD Program of SRIHER, Chennai.

Library, ICT and Physical Infrastructure / Instrumentation-

New text books/reference books and journals were added to the library. Access to National Knowledge Network, INFLIBNET and relevant online databases is made available.

Library committee has been constituted for smooth functioning of library activities.

Committee has organized following events:

- 1. Library Orientation program for newly admitted students
- 2. Orientation to staff and students on logging in to INFLIBNET and Theime Publications.
- 3. Orientation to staff on use of INFLIBNET and demonstration of Journal search options on that.

Library committee conducted two meetings to discuss the books and journals to be purchased for the year 2020-2021. This list was forwarded to Management committee for approval. Feedback from

students regarding library facility is taken every year.

All classrooms are ICT enabled since Jan 2019. Classrooms were provided with LCD and Wi-Fi facilities. Software are loaded in computers for students to practice activities related to voice analysis, voice recording, speech analysis. Computerized equipments are available for clinical work and practicum. The equipment purchased in previous year are subjected to annual calibration.

Softwares are indigenously developed for tracking the academic progress and attendance of students and examination related information. Wi-Fi facility is strengthened to accommodate additional online activity due to covid situation: -online classes and tele practice etc. Feedback and troubleshooting mechanism are in place now, for issues related to breakdown in network and internet connection. University portal is being used for e governance, student feedback, virtual notices, examination related information to students. Laptops are added to the existing ones to accommodate increase in need for online therapy and classes with the help of CSR funding of Cognizant.

Human Resource Management

New recruitments for faculty, clinical supervisors and office staffs were done in July-Aug 2020, as per report of management and CEO in Jan 2020. Interviews were held for recruitment of additional staff following due process. Temporary setbackwas seen in hiring and providing offer letters to the interviewed candidates due to covid 19 lockdown. The members of Management committee and college office have also reviewed the financial aspects during covid 19 situation and taken due measures to continue salary payment during lockdown period also and to accommodate novel situations arising regarding staff rejoining to work after lifting of lockdown and accommodate request of work from home

- 1. On account of Women's Day, the women Empowerment Committee-one of the sub-committees of IQAC organized a talk via Google Meet on 09.03.2021 from 1.30 to 2.30pm.

The talk was given by Dr.Akkai Padmashali, a renowned transgender social activist and motivational speaker. The talk was titled" Of Roses and Thorns; Journey and Dreams". Dr Akkai spoke of the difficulties she faced and how she overcame them. The staff and students of Dr.S.R.Chandrasekar Institute actively participated.

2. Happiness and Emotional wellbeing in Students: Building resilient, confident and compassionate individuals

The novel corona virus and its corresponding disease have dramatically impacted people's mental health and behavior. College students are among the most strongly affected by COVID-19 because of uncertainty regarding academic success, future careers, and social life during college, amongst other concerns. Even before the

pandemic, students experienced increasing levels of anxiety, depressive moods, and lack of self-esteem, psychosomatic problems, substance abuse, and suicidal ideas. To combat this, a happiness and emotional well-being programme was organized by Ms. Alphonsa Joseph for under-graduate students of the institute. This aimed at building resilience (an ability to bounce back from every day difficult situation or problem) and at creatively redefining a sense of confidence and self-compassion. Final year M.Sc students attending the counseling paper were trained on implementation of the 4-week programme. The program was implemented on all UG students of the college. The UG students were divided into groups and mentored by the trained PG students. The Oxford Happiness Questionnaire was administered pre and post implementation and qualitative feedback was collected at the end of the 4th week to understand the efficacy of the programme. Overall, the programme has benefitted the student's well-being and happiness during the pandemic, as evidence from the scores obtained before and after implementation.
