



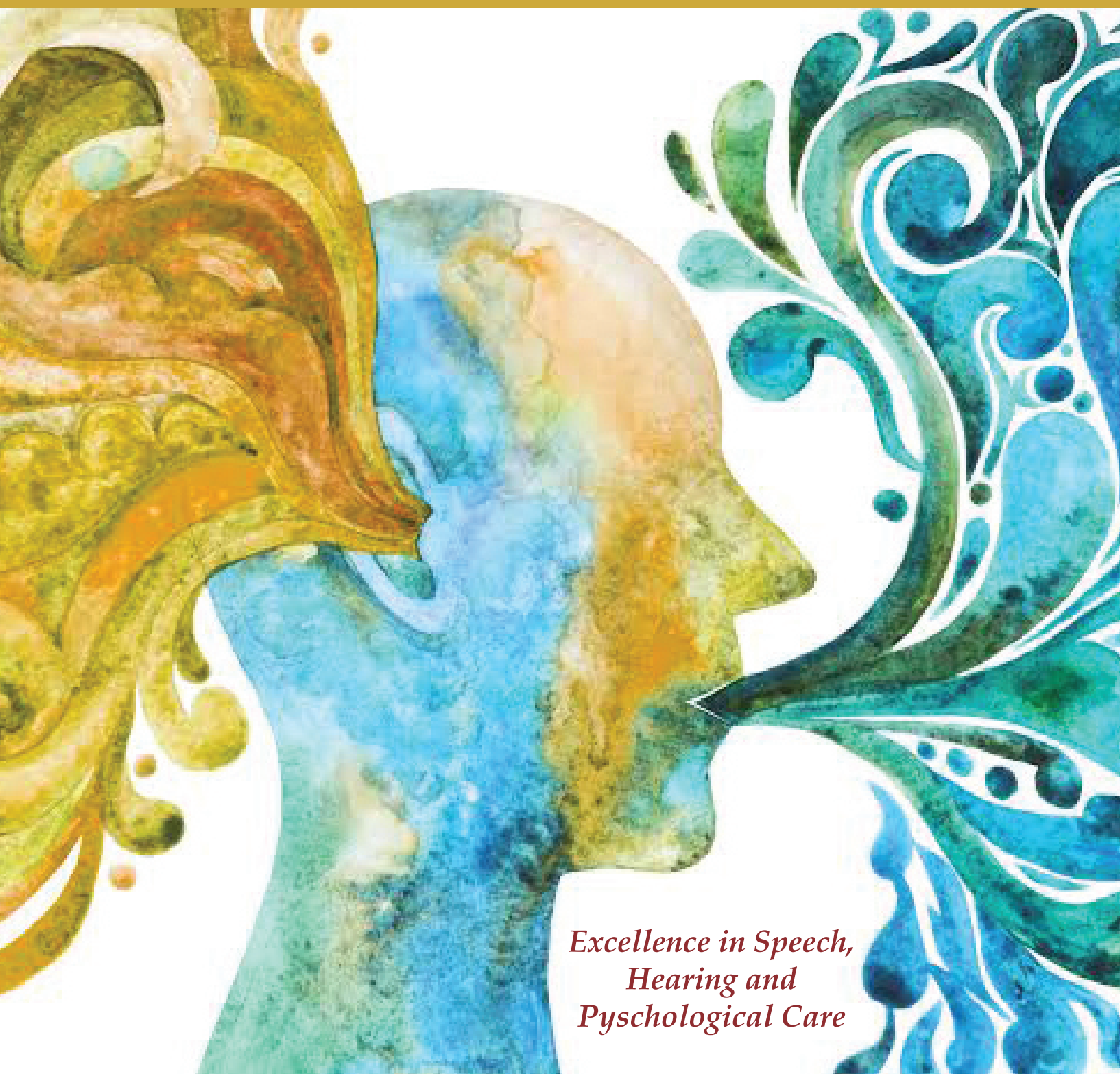

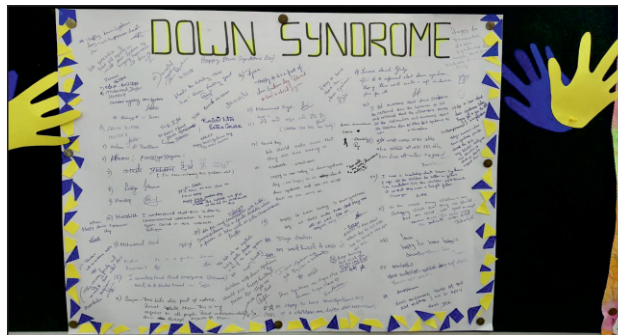


Updates from Department of Speech Language Studies

Commemoration of Awareness Days:

Down Syndrome Day:

The Department of Speech Language Studies celebrated "World Down Syndrome Day" on 21st March 2025 with a range of activities aimed at raising awareness and promoting inclusion. A parental education session was organized for parents of children with special needs covering topics such as understanding Down Syndrome, its causes, the strengths and positive traits of individuals with the condition, and inclusive practices.

Engaging tabletop activities were also conducted for children with Down Syndrome to encourage participation and interaction. Additionally, awareness ribbons were distributed to all staff members as a gesture of solidarity and support for the cause.

Parent Support Network (PSN):

On 31st January 2025, **Ms. Anukiruba**, a Clinical Supervisor Grade 1, delivered a session on the topic, **"Reading is an integral component of a child's holistic development"**. The benefits of reading and strategies in shared book reading were highlighted where it proved to be highly impactful, fostering a deeper understanding among parents regarding joint reading.

Another session of PSN was held on March 7th, 2025 which was conducted by Dr. Babita Gupta, Professor and Head, Department of Psychology. The objective of this session was to offer parents and caregivers a **behavioural framework for understanding child development and mental health**, while also providing strategies to effectively tackle behavioural challenges. It began with a fun game and a reflective activity, where parents attempted to connect nine dots with four lines without lifting the pen or pencil. This exercise encouraged problem-solving and thinking beyond conventional patterns (out of box). The session focused on the connection between a child's development and their behaviour, highlighting how developmental delays or difficulties often manifest in behavioural challenges. Parents, as co-therapists,

played a key role in reinforcing positive behaviours. By the end of the session they gained insight into developmental parameters, behavioural issues, modification strategies, and their role in fostering their child's well-being.

Student and Staff Training:

1. Using AI/Machine Learning to Predict Recovery in Post-Stroke Aphasia: Moving Towards Precision Rehabilitation.

Dr. Swati Kiran, Director of the Centre for Brain Recovery, was honored as the Fellow of the Year and visited for two days as part of her Travel Fellowship. During her visit, she delivered a series of insightful talks to

students and faculty, focusing on brain recovery and advancements in neurorehabilitation. On Day 1, Dr. Kiran presented a session titled *"Using AI/Machine Learning to Predict Recovery in Post-Stroke Aphasia: Moving Towards Precision Rehabilitation."* She explored how AI and machine learning are transforming stroke rehabilitation, particularly in predicting recovery outcomes. The session emphasized the role of neuroplasticity—the brain's capacity to reorganize and form new neural connections post-stroke—as a key element in successful rehabilitation. Feedback collected via a Google Form reflected high appreciation for her discussion on treatment outcome prediction, AI in aphasia management, and the concept of neuroplasticity.

On Day 2, she led an interactive session with faculty, offering valuable insights into advanced research methodologies, statistical approaches, ethical research practices, and publication standards. The discussion encouraged dialogue around study design, paper reviews, and ethics in U.S.-based research. Her visit provided a significant learning opportunity, inspiring faculty and students to engage more deeply in research and collaborative initiatives. The staff members gained practical insights into study design, paper reviews, encouraging future discussions and collaborations and motivated to pursue in the field of research.

1st Hands-on Workshop on Fiberoptic Endoscopic Evaluation of Swallowing (FEES) & glimpse into the larynx:

The three-day dysphagia workshop was initiated by Dr. Anita Reddy and headed by Dr. B S Premalatha had offered an in-depth blend of theory and hands-on training in Fiberoptic Endoscopic Evaluation of Swallowing (FEES). Sessions were carried out by our in-house staff as well as guest experts, on all the 3 days. The workshop offered an in-depth and immersive learning experience for all delegates, combining essential theoretical knowledge with practical application of Fiberoptic Endoscopic Evaluation of Swallowing (FEES).

Day 1 focused on the anatomy and physiology of swallowing, clinical evaluation techniques, equipment handling, and core competencies in Fiberoptic Endoscopic Evaluation of Swallowing (FEES). The day included live demonstrations and hands-on practice sessions.

Day 2 delved into anatomical landmark identification, the Susan Langmore FEES protocol, bolus presentation techniques, and the management of complex neurogenic cases. Emphasis was placed on documentation and troubleshooting, with additional hands-on sessions and normative data collection.

Day 3 centered on pre- and post-therapy comparisons using FEES, outcome documentation, and clinical case sharing. The training concluded with a panel discussion and practical training activities, reinforcing clinical application and participant learning.

Training on Auditory (Re)-Habilitation.

The Auditory Verbal Therapy Unit, in collaboration with the Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC), conducted a one-day training session on January 11, 2025, focusing on Auditory (Re)habilitation. This session aimed to enhance knowledge and skills related to hearing rehabilitation techniques. The session was led by **Ms. Pooja Behera**, (Rehabilitation Manager) at MED-EL India Pvt. Ltd., who provided expert insights into auditory rehabilitation. She discussed various techniques for improving auditory perception, speech understanding, and communication skills, particularly for those using hearing aids and cochlear implants. Participants gained practical experience through interactive discussions, case studies, and hands-on demonstrations. The training focused on speech therapy, auditory memory enhancement, and early intervention strategies. This initiative provided practical insights into auditory rehabilitation techniques.

Recent Hearing Aid technology by ALPS

The staff members of the Department of Hearing Sciences (DHS) participated in a hands-on training session focused on Recent Hearing Aid Technology on 13/01/2025. This specialized session was conducted by **Mr. Mahesh Kumar** Assistant Manager-Recruitment & Client Servicing at ALPS Human Resource Consultants Pvt. Ltd. the training aimed to enhance participants' understanding of the latest advancements in hearing aid technology, including digital signal processing, noise reduction features, wireless connectivity, and personalized fitting techniques. Mr. Mahesh provided detailed demonstrations on how modern hearing aids function, their benefits for individuals with hearing loss, and effective methods for counselling patients on device selection and maintenance. Attendees engaged in interactive discussions, practical demonstrations, and troubleshooting exercises, allowing them to gain first-hand experience with advanced hearing aid models.

Precision in Calibration: Hands-on Workshop- Student Training

The workshop aimed to provide students with practical knowledge and technical expertise in the calibration of audiological equipment. The session was by **Mr. Sachin**, a (Service Engineer) at Auditivo Hearing, who shared his expertise on the importance of precise calibration in maintaining the accuracy and reliability of hearing assessment devices. Participants received hands-on training in the calibration of audiometers, tympanometers, and other essential hearing diagnostic tools. The workshop included live demonstrations, troubleshooting techniques, and interactive discussions to help students understand the impact of calibration on hearing evaluations. This initiative successfully enhanced technical skills, industry readiness, and professional competence among students pursuing careers in audiology and hearing sciences.

Radiology of Temporal Bone related to Cochlear Implantation by Dr. Vasanthi Anand

The Department of Hearing Studies commemorated International Cochlear Implant Day by organizing a student training program on the radiology of the temporal bone in relation to cochlear implantation. The session took place on 25th February 2025 in the auditorium and was conducted by **Dr. Vasanthi Anand**, an expert in the field. She provided in-depth knowledge on the role of radiology in assessing cochlear implant candidates, understanding anatomical structures, and planning surgical procedures. The training aimed to



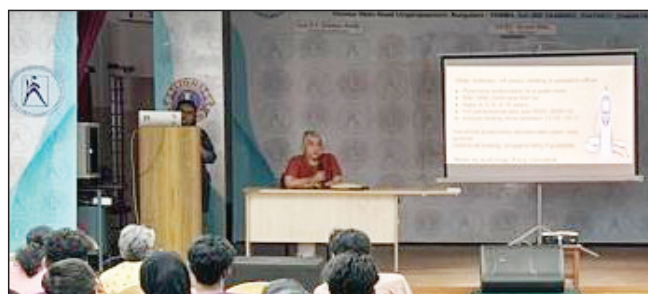

The event proved to be a significant learning opportunity, contributing to the academic and clinical knowledge of students and professionals in the field of audiology and hearing sciences.

Insights on Universal Newborn Screening and Early Intervention from a US based Paediatrician

Dr. Swapna Sabnis, a US based paediatrician, delivered an insightful talk on universal newborn screening and early intervention on March 14th, 2025. She emphasized the critical role of early detection in identifying congenital disorders, metabolic conditions, and genetic abnormalities that may not be immediately apparent at birth. Dr. Sabnis highlighted advancements in screening technologies, ensuring quicker and more accurate diagnoses. She also discussed the importance of timely interventions, which can significantly improve long-term health outcomes, particularly for conditions like hearing loss, cystic fibrosis, and metabolic disorders. Stressing the need for standardized screening across healthcare systems, she advocated for increased awareness among parents and healthcare professionals. Dr. Sabnis shared real-life cases where early intervention changed lives, reinforcing the value of proactive healthcare. She concluded by urging policymakers to expand access to screening programs, ensuring every newborn receives the best possible start in life.

Commemoration of World Hearing Day 2025

In observance of **World Hearing Day 2025**, the institute organized a series of impactful events aimed at promoting awareness about hearing health and the significance of early detection. These initiatives were conducted in collaboration with various governmental and non-governmental organizations, engaging a diverse audience through educational sessions and hearing screenings.

On the 3rd of March 2025, in association with BBMP-NPPCD, an awareness session was conducted by Ms. Rithu Rajan and Ms. Deepa at **Divya Shanthi High School**, Lingarajapuram, which was attended by 100 Accredited Social Health Activist (ASHA) workers and Medical Health Officers (MHOs). The session focused on the importance of early hearing loss detection, the necessity of regular hearing screenings, and key developmental milestones in speech and language acquisition. Additionally, hearing screenings were conducted for all attendees to facilitate early identification of auditory impairments.

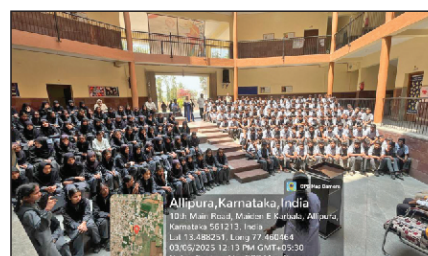
On the 4th of March 2025, in collaboration with the Department for the Empowerment of Differently Abled and Senior Citizens, as well as the Department of Child and Women Welfare, a training program was held at the Sambrama Sabhangana Auditorium, Hosur Road, Bengaluru. Approximately 100 Village Rehabilitation Workers (VRWs) and Multipurpose Rehabilitation Workers (MRWs) participated in this event, which included orientation sessions on hearing health, the distribution of informational pamphlets, and an interactive question-and-answer segment that received highly positive feedback. Furthermore, interested participants underwent hearing screenings to assess their auditory health.

Commemoration of World Hearing Day 2025

On 5th March 2025, faculty members from the institute set up a stall at **Azim Premji University, Bengaluru** focussing on noise-induced hearing loss and preventive measures showcasing KARNA, the mannequin developed by the institute as a replica of 'Jolene,' the prototype designed by Dangerous Decibels under the leadership of Dr. Billy Martin. Students were educated on the risks associated with excessive noise exposure from Personal Listening Devices (PLDs) and were provided with guidelines on safe listening practices. Flyers containing additional information were also distributed to reinforce awareness and encourage preventive action.

On 6th March 2025, an outreach program was carried out at **Noble School, Alipura**, where students, teachers, and members of the general public attended a session on different types of hearing disorders and their impact on academic performance. Simultaneously, at the Urban Primary Health Care Centre, New Bagalur Layout, staff nurses and mothers participated in an awareness program on early identification and intervention for hearing loss. This session was followed by newborn and infant hearing screenings at the (UPHC) Urban Primary Health Centre to support early diagnosis and intervention of hearing loss.

The activities undertaken by Dr.SRCISH for World Hearing Day 2025 successfully disseminated crucial information on hearing health and its implications across multiple sectors of society, as per the guidelines laid down by the World Health Organization (WHO). By engaging healthcare professionals, students, rehabilitation workers, and the general public, these initiatives played a vital role in fostering awareness, encouraging early detection, and promoting proactive intervention strategies for hearing disorders.

New Beginnings

Collaboration with Salus University

Drexel University's Salus Osborne College of Audiology has signed an Affiliation Agreement with the Institute to provide clinical training for MSc in Clinical Audiology students. This partnership enables students to gain hands-on experience in diagnosing and treating hearing and balance disorders across age groups, while benefiting from expert supervision and state-of-the-art facilities. In return, the Clinical Training Site, the Institute receives in-kind remuneration through access to coursework. The agreement outlines shared responsibilities to ensure a high-quality, ethical, and inclusive learning environment for future audiologists. In February 2025, the Department of Hearing Studies welcomed Ms Ankitha Chavan-student Master's program in Clinical Audiology at Salus - Drexel university for her training on Cochlear Implant management.

Collaboration with Sri Madhusudan Sai Institute of Medical Sciences and Research

A new MoU has been signed between Sri Madhusudan Sai Institute of Medical Sciences & Research (SMSIMSR) and Bangalore Speech and Hearing Trust through Dr. S.R. Chandrasekhar Institute of Speech and Hearing (DrSRCISH) to enhance newborn hearing screening, speech therapy, and AVT services. This collaboration will equip SMSIMSR with advanced audiological tools and trained personnel, conduct outreach programs via a mobile unit, and provide up to 500 free hearing aids to BPL beneficiaries. The partnership aims to improve early identification and rehabilitation of communication disorders, with both institutions jointly contributing to training, service delivery, and research.

Updates from Department of Psychology

Talks Conducted:

On February 19, 2025, Dr. Babita Gupta and Mr. Sumanth conducted an orientation session for a group of 30 CBID trainees visiting the Department of Psychology. The session covered practices and rehabilitation strategies, the importance of psychometric assessment (IQ), children's behavioral and emotional issues, autism, the role of parent training, psychoeducation, and counseling.

Parent Training Sessions:

- A parent training session on “**behavioral issues**” was conducted on 27th January. A total of 11 parents attended the same. The session focused on practical strategies to address and manage challenging behaviour effectively. Group activities were incorporated that was designed to encourage role playing, allowing parents to

engage in real life scenarios and gain a deeper understanding of behaviour management techniques. Through interactive tasks, parents explored various approaches to handle behavioral challenges, including the use of social rewards and assigning them manageable activities tailored to their child's abilities.

- Another parent training session was conducted on February 18 and 19, 2025, with 13 parents in attendance. The session focused on the **importance of positive reinforcement and encouragement in shaping children's behavior**. Parents were introduced to effective reinforcement strategies through group activities and role-play exercises, allowing them to actively participate and share their reflections

Attention building tasks including bead stringing and puzzle-solving were conducted to help parents engage their children while reinforcing positive behaviour. Parents were encouraged to use verbal praise, and tangible rewards like stickers to boost motivation and sustain focus. The sessions received positive feedback, with parents recognizing the impact of reinforcement and structured activities in improving attention and behaviors.

- On March 18th and 26th, two parent training sessions were held on the topic '**Behavioral Challenges and Management**.' A total of 10 parents participated across both sessions. These sessions aimed to equip parents with effective strategies to understand, manage, and respond to behavioral challenges exhibited by their children. Parents were guided through various evidence based techniques such as positive reinforcement, visual schedules and behaviour modification strategies to enhance their child's adaptive skills. The training emphasized the importance of consistency, patience and collaboration between parents and professionals to create a supportive environment for their children's growth and development

- Parental training sessions on **remedial training** were conducted between January and March, specifically on January 30, February 25, March 4, and March 18, 2025. 15 parents attended the program

along with their children. Interactive sessions were held with parents and children to discuss their concerns, followed by joint activities designed for both groups. Parents were introduced to strategies they could use at home to support their children's development in areas such as attention, phonetics, visual coordination, auditory memory, and multisensory learning. Feedback was collected from parents at the end of the session. Overall, all parents were found benefitted and enthusiastic to have been a part of the parent training session..

Educational Support for Students enrolled under the National Institute of Open Schooling NIOS Program

In January, revision sessions were conducted, during which students demonstrated cooperative behavior. Additionally, Individualized Education Plan (IEP) assessments were carried out, were checklists completed in collaboration with parents."

In February, NIOS exams were conducted for Level A, B, and C. The children wrote the exams along with their parents. Most parents expressed concerns about their child's behavioral issues and hoped for improvement in that area. Additionally, they emphasized the need for support in academic progress, social skills, and attention span. Additional periods, including playtime, music sessions, story time, social activities and video time, were introduced to enhance the children's engagement and learning experience.

March 2025- Next-level classes for children have started. Children in Level A have moved to Level B, and Level B children have moved to Level C. Sensory integration, behaviour therapy, gym and games [multi-purpose room] activities have started this month.

New Beginnings

- **Counseling Cell** – Counseling for all age groups was opened to the public to avail counseling services for varied mental health concerns. This initiative primarily addresses how clients can focus on their mental health which is as important as their physical health.
- **Individual Behaviour Therapy sessions** for children with varied developmental disorders to cater to their wellbeing and foster growth. These sessions primarily focus on their overall development such as improving their behavioural problems, fine and gross motor skills, eye contact etc.
- **Parent counseling and training sessions** is also a new initiative by the department to bridge the gaps parents face in fostering development in their children or how to work on intervention at home setting. We often tend to forget about the wellbeing and mental health of parents as the sessions primarily focus on the wellbeing of the parents.
- **In house services/parent training session** -Held on 12/2/2025 with 5 children and their mothers at Mothers Training Centre (who needs psychological support) and further planning for behaviour therapy. Later Psycho-social training sessions have started to enhance their gross motor, fine motor and social skills and to also work on their sensory and behaviour issues.
- Dr. Babita Gupta delivered a Parent **Psychoeducation Session** to parents of Sunaad School (X STD) on 13th Feb 2025. Mainly focused on how to improve memory and focus on the studies for coming board exams, various techniques and strategies to cope up with examination stress. The parents were grateful and agreed to follow the same.
- Mindfulness Connections for Emotional Wellbeing is an initiative for staff, faculty and students of Dr SRCISH only. The purpose of this initiative is to foster emotional well-being, and to facilitate a supportive and empowering community

“Bridging the Gap: How Speech Language Pathologists Can Empower Parents for Communication Success.” on 13/03/2025

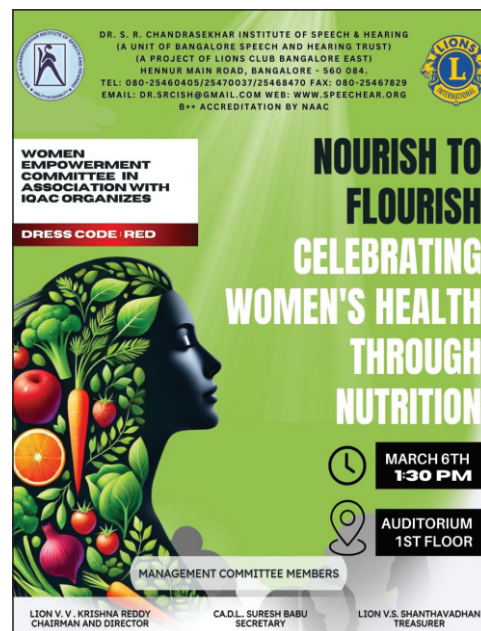

SPIEL intercollege sports fest

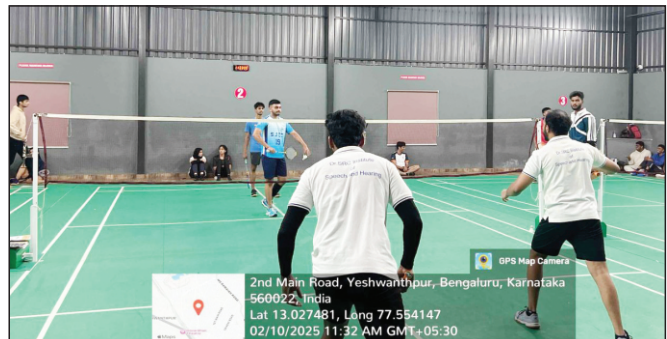
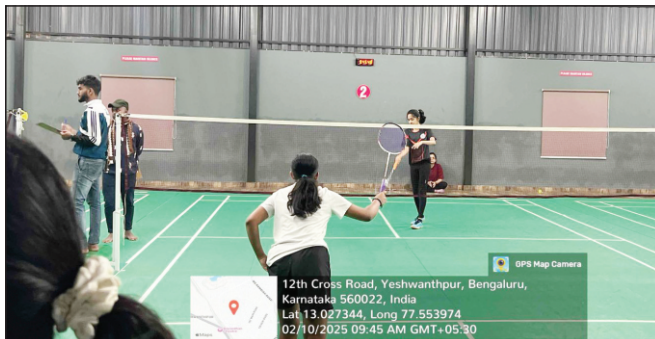

Stress Free Life: A Healthy Life

We all feel stress at one time or another. Nowadays, we can't imagine a life without hassle or stress. The stresses and strain of today play upon everyone. It is a slow poison to a person's mental and physical well-being. It occurs when a person is required to perform beyond normal capability, or is caught in a situation where he/she feels has lost control.

There are two types of stress: Eustress and Distress. The first one is "good" stress, which motivates us to perform more and to keep us on our toes. It goes up to threshold level after which the eustress converts itself into distress, or "bad" stress, which actually brings down our performance and causes many physical and psychological problems.

How does stress affect us?

- Inability to take decision
- High blood pressure
- Indigestion
- Psychosomatic disorder such as Diabetes, peptic ulcer, hypertension, asthma, heart diseases and obesity,
- Insomnia
- Depression
- Anxiety
- Stroke
- Headache
- And Many More

How to identify the symptoms of stress? Stress checklist gives an idea of identifying the symptoms which are listed below:

- Irritability
- Lack of concentration
- Loss of appetite, overeating or undereating
- Disturbances in sleep
- Anxiety
- Lack of interest or feeling of overwhelmed
- Grumpiness
- Sadness
- Avoiding friends
- Spending more time on Screen unnecessary
- Postponing the task
- Sign of neuromuscular tension- fidgeting, tapping fingers, pacing the floor, frowning, fixed stare, clenching fists and jaws, curling feet and legs around the chair legs, hesitancy in speech

Proactive Tips to manage Stress:

1. Learn to enjoy work, however boring or monotonous you think it has become. There are always ways and means to develop that enjoyment. Think.....
2. Set the short terms and long term goals, Prioritize the work, Break the task into smaller task and set the deadline to finish the work, maintain continuity and regularity for completing the task

3. Seek breaks from routine on a regular basis, going out, chat with friends and a weekend trip
4. Release stress through Play (sports/indoor games)
5. Stay connected with family, friends, and society
6. Spend less time on social media, mobile and internet
7. Spend quality time with family, relatives and friend
8. Take healthy diet and drink plenty of water, Avoid Tamasic Food
9. Take rest pauses whenever you feel mentally tired
10. Laughter and plants/nature serves as a therapy which are helpful in reducing stress.
11. Need for hobbies
12. Learn something new and creative
13. Maintain a stress diary for a week, list the stressors you experience in class, at home, workplace or in various relationships. For the next two weeks, use a relaxation technique either before breakfast/morning or before dinner/evening. Practice relaxation or deep breathing which helps in releasing tension in the skeletal muscles and reduces anxiety
14. Regular walking. If you are very busy, you don't have time for walking/jogging. Make your mind to start once in a week for 10 minutes, second week 15 minutes and gradually increase the number of days and minutes/hours.
15. Place of love and spirituality in your life. Focus on the present, not the past and future. This serves as investment or savings in your account for building a healthy and happy future hence, enjoy each moment. Friends believe life is short.
16. Yoga therapies and meditation are very useful pills to enhance physical and mental well-being. Have it regularly and find the positive changes in your perception and attitude. Enjoy each moment of life, finding a purpose in life, when you see yourself beyond your body and your jobs, when you give a deeper meaning to your existence, you feel that your worth is high and enhance psychological flexibility.

Friends, getting ready for Yoga therapy and mindful meditation, follow the steps

Step 1: Tadasana, Alternate nostril breathing and Bhramari

Step 2: " Sit up straight on the chair, let your shoulders drop, keep your legs on the floor, close the eyes and take a deep breath, and notice how you are breathing(pause for few second), just notice what you can hear (pause for few seconds), just notice what you can feel against your skin (pause for few second), just notice what you can smell (pause for few second), just notice what you are feeling ((pause for few second), just notice what you are thinking ((pause for few second), just observe the thoughts. So there is a part of you that can notice everything that you see, hear, smell, think and feel. It is called "the observing self." Observing the mind, thoughts, and detached with body and mind. Stay still in this state for some more time.

Step3: Gradually open the eyes, gently rub the palms and give warmth on your face.

And even now, nothing beats watching the sunset dip into the Arabian Sea with a plate of roasted corn in hand.

If You Love Seafood, You'll Love Us

Mangalore is heaven for seafood lovers. People say, once you try an Anjal fry (Kingfish) or Bangude Pulimunchi (spicy mackerel curry), you'll be hooked. I have heard a lot about it but never tried as I am vegetarian. We use a lot of coconut, curry leaves, and roasted spices — our recipes have been passed down for generations. Whether it's homemade Kane Rava Fry or the humble Kube Sukkhe (clams sautéed in spices), the flavors are deeply rooted in our coastal identity.

Our Culture Runs Deep

Our traditions are a beautiful blend of Tulu, Konkani, Beary, and Kannada influences. One of my favorite memories is watching Yakshagana performances — a dramatic all-night theatre with dancers in bright costumes, music, and stories from mythology. There's also Bhuta Kola, a spirit worship ceremony that's not just performance, but part of our spiritual core.

Temples that Tell Stories

Every temple in Mangalore has a story. The Mangaladevi Temple — yes, the one our city is named after — has a special place in our hearts. And the Kudroli Gokarnanatheshwara Temple? It lights up like a dream during Navaratri, with processions, music, and a sea of lights. There's a sense of peace and history in these places that's hard to put into words.

Pilivesha – The Soul of Our Festivals

And then there's Pilivesha — the Tiger Dance. If you've ever been in Mangalore during Dasara or Krishna Janmashtami, you know what I mean. Dancers painted head-to-toe like tigers move to the rhythm of traditional drums, drawing huge crowds. It's loud, colorful, chaotic, and absolutely thrilling. It's not just a dance — it's a roar of pride for us locals.

Mangalore isn't just a city. It's a feeling — warm, welcoming, full of flavors and stories. Whether you're here for the beaches, the food, or the festivals, I promise you'll leave with a little bit of Mangalore in your heart.

Understanding External Ear Canal Cholesteatoma (EACC)

External Ear Canal Cholesteatoma (EACC) is a rare but clinically important condition characterized by a cystic mass lined with keratinizing squamous epithelium. Although cholesteatomas are typically associated with the middle ear, they are not uncommonly found in the external auditory canal. The incidence of EACC is estimated to range between 0.1% and 5% of all otologic cases. EACC can be classified into two types: spontaneous and congenital. Spontaneous EACC occurs without an identifiable cause and in patients with anatomically normal external ear canals, whereas congenital EACC is associated with congenital narrowing of the canal, predisposing the individual to epithelial entrapment. The etiology of EACC remains unclear, although many cases develop following ear surgery, trauma to the external auditory canal, or due to canal stenosis or obstruction. Post-surgical cases often result from the entrapment of squamous epithelium, while traumatic causes include lacerations or fractures leading to canal narrowing.

Pathophysiologically, the condition is thought to be driven by the accumulation of keratin debris, which may provoke abnormal cellular proliferation due to impaired epithelial migration, possibly linked to reduced vascular supply. Clinically, EACC may present with otorrhea (ear discharge), chronic dull otalgia (ear pain), and conductive hearing loss. Diagnosis is typically made through high-resolution temporal bone CT imaging, which may reveal soft tissue masses, bone erosion, embedded bone fragments, and in severe cases, erosion of the facial canal or tegmen tympani. The differential diagnosis includes keratosis obturans, neoplasms of the external ear, post-inflammatory medial canal fibrosis, and malignant necrotizing otitis externa. Understanding these distinctions is crucial for accurate diagnosis and management.

Treatment for EACC is surgical and varies depending on the extent of disease involvement. Stage 1 involves canaloplasty alone, Stage 2 includes tympanoplasty, Stage 3 adds mastoidectomy, and Stage 4 involves individualized surgery based on lesion location and severity. If left untreated, EACC can result in serious complications, including involvement of the facial nerve and erosion into the cranial base via the tegmen tympani. Early diagnosis and appropriate surgical intervention are key to preventing long-term morbidity. As awareness increases, ENT specialists can expect improved patient outcomes through prompt identification and treatment of this rare entity.

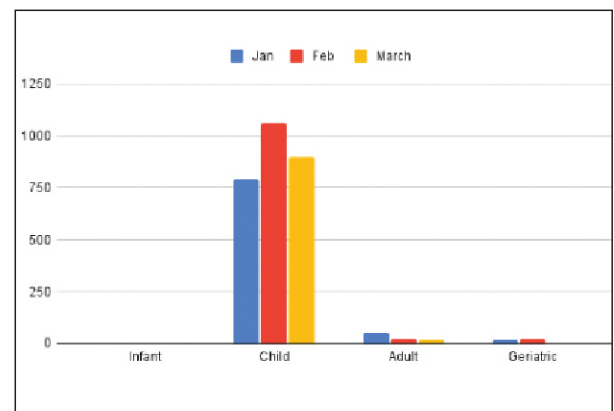

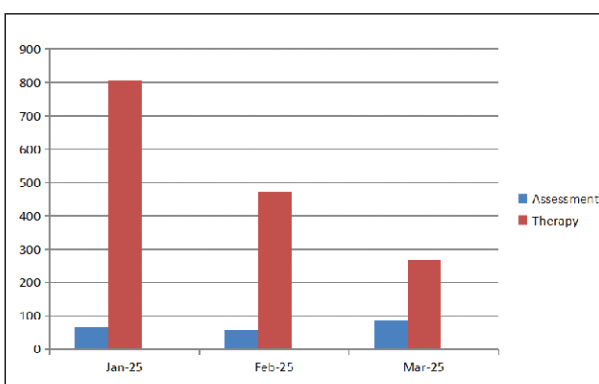
Auditory Verbal Therapy Unit:
Sessions Taken



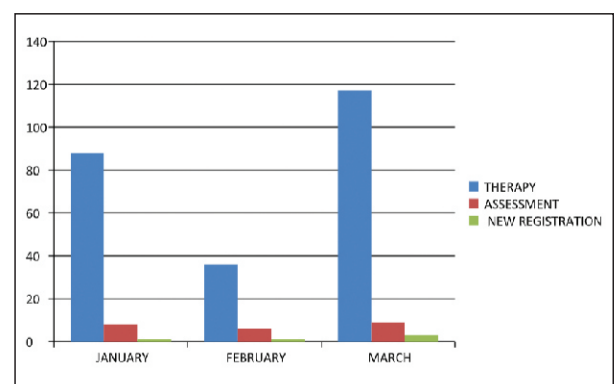
Speech Diagnostics Unit: Clients seen

Department of Hearing Studies

Audiometry: Institute's Audiometry facility is adequately equipped to measure hearing acuity of patients for variations in sound intensity and pitch, tonal purity, thresholds and frequencies.

Hearing Aid (HA) Prescription and Fitting: Our team of experienced Audiologists and Technicians select the right hearing aid based on individual's need, degree of hearing loss and comfort level.

Custom Ear Mould Making: Hearing Aids are ideally fitted to a patient's ear through a carefully custom-crafted Silicone ear mould. Our in house facility meets this requirement effectively.

Hearing Aid Repair and Service: Hearing Aids are a miniature marvel of modern technology and require regular servicing, maintenance and expert repairs. The team at the Institute has all the expertise for this service.

Auditory Verbal Therapy & Post Cochlear Implant rehabilitation: Children with speech disabilities are trained by our expert therapists to understand speech and learn to talk after they have been fitted with a hearing aid or treated with a cochlear implant. For those children who have undergone cochlear implant, a thorough rehabilitation process is undertaken that helps the child utilize the auditory signals and to naturally integrate the various components of communication such as listening, speech, language, reading and thinking.

Mapping for Cochlear Implant: A Cochlear implant is a small, complex electronic device that helps provide a sense of sound to a child who is profoundly deaf or severely hard-of-hearing. It consists of an external part that sits behind the ear and an internal part that is surgically placed under the skin. Together they are a combine of a tiny microphone, speech processor, transmitter and receiver, an electrode array that collects the impulses from receiver and sends them to different regions of the auditory nerve. Complex as they are, they need regular 'mapping' using advanced computer technology, to meet the response of the child and gradual tuning to meet the child's comfort needs. Our experts in the institute effectively carry out this specialised service.

Noise Measurement: Identifying 'noise' as a cause for hearing loss, our Institute provides services to measure the noise levels in factories, work places and public areas. Our

experts with appropriate noise measuring equipment do extensive study and report on the permissible or hazardous limits, by which measures can be taken to prevent hearing damages of the people in those environments.

Voice Clinic: Our Institute is adequately equipped with talent and technology to diagnose and treat voice disorders such as hoarseness, scratchy voice, breathy voice, difficulty with loudness, pain or discomfort while speaking or singing, etc.

Endostroboscopy: The Institute is equipped with state of the art Endostroscope facility to assess vocal cord vibration patterns, mucosal pliability, study the underlying layered structure of the vocal folds, etc. This accurate diagnostics help the patient to get the most appropriate treatment.

Speech Therapy Services

Dr. S.R. Chandrasekhar Institute of Speech and Hearing deals with a number of investigatory and treatment protocols related to speech disabilities.

With eminent practitioners, it offers treatment and rehabilitative services to many disorders associated with speech.

Misarticulation - a speech defect in which an individual substitutes, omits, adds or distorts the speech sounds which results in the speech being unintelligible.

Stuttering - is a speech disorder in which sounds, syllables, or words are repeated or prolonged, disrupting the normal flow of speech, sometimes accompanied by struggling behaviors.

Cleft lip and Palate - refers to a physical condition wherein a child is born with a split or torn lip(s) with a hole in the roof of the mouth leading to speech disorders.

Cerebral Palsy (CP) - reflects a non progressive group of disorders affecting body movement and muscle coordinations due to anomaly of the developing brain.



Autism - a developmental disorder characterized by difficulties in social interaction, communication and by restricted and repetitive behavior which manifests within the very first two years of life.

Aphasia - the impairment of language function which results from strokes and other injuries to the language areas of the brain.

Dysarthria - an acquired speech problem caused by paralysis, weakness, or inability to coordinate the muscles of the mouth.

Learning Disability - a neurological condition that prevents a person from learning or severely impairs the learning process in one or more academic areas, despite being intelligent.

Dysphagia - is a condition that causes difficulties in swallowing.

Laryngectomy - is a procedure that involves removing part or all of the voice box usually as a result of a cancerous tumour in the larynx resulting in loss of voice and requiring to learn new methods of speaking.

Psychology Unit

The Institute has eminent expertise to conduct developmental assessments on children to identify developmental delays (DQ/SQ).

IQ Assessment: Intelligent quotient (IQ) or IQ tests are conducted to measure aptitude and intellectual capacities and provide an estimate of an individual's mental abilities.
